10 things I have noticed in Germany

I have been in a few different villages and cities Lower Saxony, Germany since May 25th and these are a few of the things I have noticed.

1. Bricks, bricks, and more bricks.

Everywhere you look there are bricks, the houses are made of bricks, the sidewalks are made of bricks, the parking lots are made of bricks, and even some roads are made of bricks.

2. Roads

The roads are narrower and in some sections are only wide enough for one car. There are very few stop signs. I have also noticed that many of the roads have large trees alongside them, and in some places this creates a canopy over the road. Most of the roads don't go in a straight line, and they are more spread out than in Canada, but there are many bike/tractor paths between fields.

3. Crops

The main crops I have seen so far are: sugar beets, corn, wheat, barley, and canola, as well as strawberries and asparagus.

4. Tractors

Driving a tractor in Germany requires a license and instead of a SMV (slow moving vehicle) sign, they have license plates and speed limit signs on the back of the tractors and wagons. Tractors can go on almost any road. As many farms are right in the village, it is common to see multiple tractors go through a village every day.

5. Meals

The largest meal of the day is lunch. Germans tend to have a small breakfast, and dinner is normally leftovers from lunch and/or bread. If the weather is nice, lunch and dinner are eaten outside.

6. Restaurants

Many of the restaurants I have walked past have an outside patio area; they also have big doors or windows that let the entire front of the restaurant open.

7. Bikes

Germany is very bike friendly and Germans like to bike everywhere. In some spots, there are more bikes than cars.

8. Vehicles

The majority of vehicles in Germany are manual transmission. I have seen a few cars I recognize, but there are a lot of cars I have never heard of or seen. In the few weeks I have been here, I have seen less than 25 pickup trucks. Instead everyone drives a car, van or SUV.

9. Villages

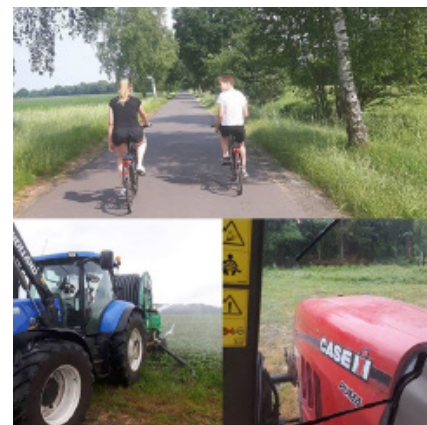
In Germany everyone (including farmers) live in a village or city, some villages are really small and some are only a few kilometers apart.

10. I'm not in Canada anymore.

This is pretty obvious; as soon as I got off the plane I could tell I was no longer in Canada.

Durham West Junior Farmers team up with Durham West 4H to help a local fair

This spring, the Durham West Junior Farmers (DWJF) initiated a community project to revamp the aging cattle ties at Elgin Park, home of the Uxbridge Fall Fair. The Uxbridge Fall Fair is a marquee event for the Township of Uxbridge and like most local fairs; it's organized by the local Agricultural Society.

Over the last several years, the DWJF have held many events in the Township of Uxbridge to raise funds for community betterment initiatives. After recognizing a need to update the cattle ties used for the Uxbridge Fall Fair, the DWJF felt it would be an excellent opportunity to support a local agricultural fair while also ensuring that some of the funds raised over the last couple of years could be put back into the community.

The project was a team effort; the Durham West Junior Farmers worked with the Durham West 4-H Dairy Club on the project and also made a \$2,500 donation to assist with purchasing supplies. The reconstruction of the cattle ties took place on May 26, many volunteers from both DWJF and 4-H were on hand to assist with the project. It was a very hot but productive day with the new cattle ties completed in plenty of time for the fair in September.

The Species at Risk Farm Incentive Program is back for 2018

Guelph ON – The Species at Risk Farm Incentive Program (SARFIP) is back for 2018! SARFIP supports Ontario producers who are enhancing on-farm habitat for species at risk across the province. The Ontario Soil and Crop Improvement Association (OSCIA), with support from the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, is pleased to continue to offer this impactful program.

“SARFIP has a great legacy of supporting producers who are looking to make improvements on their farms while also enriching farm habitat for species at risk,” said Peter McLaren, President of OSCIA. “Through cost-share funding, SARFIP supports projects that benefit both farmers and species at risk.”

Producers in Ontario can access cost-share dollars for on-farm projects that implement a variety of Best Management Practices (BMPs). With a diversity of project opportunities, eligible BMPs encompass activities around croplands, grasslands, shorelines, stream banks, wetlands and woodlands. Many opportunities are available to support critical habitat through SARFIP, including cross fencing for rotational grazing, watering systems for livestock, native tree planting, improved stream crossings, native grassland plantings, invasive species removal and erosion control structures, among others.

SARFIP 2018 is open to all agricultural landowners in the province. Projects that provide indirect benefits to species at risk are eligible for 50% cost-share, and projects that directly benefit species at risk are eligible for 65%. An additional bonus of 10% cost-share is available for direct benefit projects if the producer is interested in enrolling in SAR-Watch, a monitoring program that measures the impact of SARFIP projects on the ground for species at risk. A farm business can access up to \$20,000 in 2018.

“Farmers are in a unique position to implement farm management practices that benefit species at risk while improving their farm’s productivity,” expressed Andréa Dubé-Goss, Environmental Programs Manager at OSCIA. “We’re working hard to carry on the legacy and continue to deliver programs like SARFIP that have tremendous value for both species at risk and Ontario farmers.”

To find out if SARFIP is a good fit with your farm, consult the program brochure for complete and detailed program information. All program materials, including the brochure and application forms can be found on the OSCIA website. To be eligible to participate in SARFIP, Ontario farms must have a completed 4th Edition Environmental Farm Plan (EFP) workbook and Action Plan that has been verified and completed within the last five years.

Applications are now being accepted, and funding will be allocated to eligible projects in the order in which they are received. Funding for this program is limited; if you have a project idea that fits, submit your application as soon as possible. Projects must be initiated on or after April 1, 2018.

From May 27th to June 2nd, I had the opportunity of hosting a delegate from Northern Ireland and got the chance to meet and get to know a total of 7 delegates from across the world. It all started on the Saturday evening when my cousin, Andrew Huitema, and I travelled to Matt Smith's house to pick up our delegates. Once we arrived, Ethan from Australia and Hazel from Scotland greeted us. While we waited for our billeted delegates to arrive from the airport, we got to know Ethan and Hazel. Once Laura from Northern Ireland and Severin from Switzerland got to the house, we left for our individual homes so that they could get some rest.

The day trips began **Sunday**, with Oxford County touring the seven delegates around to a dairy farm in Tavistock, Leaping Deer Adventure Farm, and a tour of the De Bruyn's sow barn. The Sunday was concluded with a BBQ at the De Bruyn's farm and getting back to host families. Four households hosted delegates during this week: Andrew Huitema, myself, Becky Mat-tice, and Matt Smith. Monday morning began with a tour of Bonnieheath Winery and Lavender Farm in Waterford. Next was a tour of St. Williams Nursery and Forestry, and then a walk of Backus Woods Forest and Turkey Point beach.

On Tuesday I had the opportunity to drive some of the delegates to Niagara Falls. We all received an Adventure Pass which consisted of a trip on the Whirlpool Aero Car, White Water walk, Hornblower, and the Niagara Fury. For lunch, the delegates got to experience the Rain Forest Café. Friday, the delegates got to sleep in a wee bit and then ventured off to The Apple Place in Simcoe. They arrived just in time to see the apples being packed and got to see everything that goes into the processing right down to how the boxes are put together. After the tour, they were all treated to the Norfolk county's official donut "apple cider donut". From there, they all enjoyed lunch at the Simcoe Arms and then made their way to Sarah Judd's garden which is able to feed just over 70 fami-lies. Here they also learned about strawberries, different types of varieties, and the different vegetables she grows. The busy Friday concluded at Van der Steege dairy farm for a BBQ, dance, and bonfire social.

Saturday was their last adventure day of the week with Haldimand-Norfolk & Wentworth-Niagara JF crews. Delegates were able to attend the Wentworth-Niagara Ag tour for the day going to many different places, and seeing all the diversity of farms and much more. Delegates packed their things, and ended the day with a BBQ, fire, and of course dancing. There was a great Junior Farmer turn out, designated drivers for each day that we are very grateful for, and a big shout out to our host families.
