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JFAO Through the Years

For 80 years, the Junior Farmers' Association of Ontario has been marching right along. We have marched along through good times and bad times, through peace and war time, all across our province and far beyond its borders. Now as we stand on the beginning of our 8th decade as a province-wide Association.

Our roots extend beyond the 80 years we celebrated in 2024 to agricultural short courses in the early 1900s. The first clubs were formed in 1914 (Durham, Middlesex, Peel, and York Counties) and the idea soon spread like wildfire to every corner of this province. By 1944, we had progressed far enough to feel the need for a unifying body and this need was confirmed by a historic meeting on April 4, 1944, in the Parliament Buildings in Toronto. This meeting voted to form a provincial association, and Gordan Orr, from York County, became our first president of the organization.

One year later, at the first annual meeting, a 20-point plan for action was adopted and it is interesting to compare the

concerns of that day with those of today. A few, such as a Provincial War Services Fund, Home Beautification Projects and Farm Radio Forum Groups have fallen by the wayside but many others are still operating today. Regular monthly meetings (including online participation) remain the basis of our organization; short courses on leadership became intensive weekend workshops and seminars in 1980s; regional field days are today known as Summer and Winter Games; provincial public speaking, drama and amateur entertainment contests have been renamed to Sing Swing (and former event Culturama); and our annual March Conference continues to this day.

Some of JFAO projects and events include Leadership camp, first offered in 1947 and this is where Margaret Watson wrote the "Junior Farmer Song"! Camp has been offered almost continuously since its inception. In 1950, four Junior Farmers, and one leader travelled to the United Kingdom as representatives of JFAO. This evolved into the travel program, which is still offered today in: Scotland, Northern Ireland, Republic of Ireland, Austria, Germany, Switzerland, and Tasmania. The Century Farm sign project was initiated by Junior Farmers in Canada's Centennial Year of 1967. This program still continues to this day, and has expanded to French signs and add on signs; 125, 150, 175, 200, and 225 years.

JFAO is ever evolving with the times, embracing and overcoming new challenges. We are finding new ways to communicate to its membership, alumni, and the community, whether its through social media, attending trade shows, phone calls, or meeting stakeholders in the community. Much has changed in 80 years but a lot is still the same. Our foundations have retained the same spirit but over the years we have evolved to arrive at the remarkably diverse program structure that we have today. The JFAO's motto, formerly known as "self help and community

betterment" has been updated in recent years "building leaders, building communities." JFAO strives to always encourage new growth and new development of our membership which is the most important part of our Association. Through the continued dedication of our membership, JFAO would not stand where it is today. There will always be a need for young people to learn social, communication and leadership skills and for them to practice those skills in their local communities. Through talking with some of the alumni at the 80th Anniversary and hearing their stories and memories from their times in JFAO, I look forward to witnessing the progress that future generations of JF's will make and I look forward to reminiscing on my JFAO memories.

Purpose and Principles

JFAO provides opportunities for young people of all backgrounds, but especially those in rural Ontario, to take on the challenge of exploring their individual talents and potential to develop personally while being involved in improving their communities, networking, and having fun. Members are guided by the motto “Building Leaders. Building Communities.” and the mission “to build rural leaders through personal growth, travel, experiences, and community betterment” as they conduct positive social and educational activities which satisfy their personal needs and interests while conducting service projects which support the needs of their communities. Programs and opportunities provided by JFAO and its affiliated clubs help develop in members a sense of social and environmental responsibility, the ability to provide effective leadership, and an awareness of good citizenship within the community and world around them. JFAO serves as the means through which the mission and principles may be developed and maintained throughout Ontario. JFAO provides coordination and leadership to clubs and provides opportunities to network through a variety of inter-club competitions, activities, and exchanges. JFAO gives future leaders a chance to become leaders of today and tomorrow while maintaining a connection with our roots.

Affiliation Requirements

Any group of individuals may show their desire to become affiliated with JFAO by paying membership fees for each member (aged 15-29 as of the first of January) and presenting a list of officers to JFAO. Clubs must conduct a continuing program of activities throughout the year to meet the following minimum requirements:

- a) Submit a current club photo, labelled with member’s names and executive positions for archiving purposes.
- b) Complete at least one community betterment project.
- c) Complete at least two of:
 - a. A joint JF/youth activity, or
 - b. A conservation project, or
 - c. An agricultural education activity, or
 - d. A social engagement club project.
- d) Have at least one event reported on by television, radio, print, or social media.
- e) Submit a minimum of five photos of activities.
- f) Submit one article related to the history of JF in the area (optional).
- g) Have a meeting or part of a meeting on:
 - a. The structure and purpose of JFAO
 - b. Effective meeting procedures.
- h) Submit a copy of the official minutes for two club meetings.

Marketing Taskforce Update

At the 2024 AGM, a resolution was passed to use funds from the endowment fund to pay for a marketing campaign to increase membership as it was at an all-time low with only 165 members across the province. As a result of this resolution, a taskforce was formed. Kahntact was the company approved by the board, at the recommendation of the taskforce, to complete the marketing campaign.

Kahntact will be marketing for JFAO throughout 2025 with the goal of increasing membership. The marketing plans include creating a video with member and alumni testimonials that can be shared on social media. Posts made by Kahntact featuring members and events will

also be shared in a 3–5-month social media campaign, with a special focus placed on clubs that are struggling to maintain their membership numbers. In addition, a traditional ad will be placed in farm media magazines and websites. Kahntact will also assist local clubs with their social media and advertising by hosting a workshop at March conference 2025 and by creating social media templates to be used by clubs. Pending sponsorship, the campaign may be able to expand to include other ideas such as a contest for bringing a friend to events.

The taskforce is hopeful that the campaign will significantly increase membership and are looking forward to the coming year!

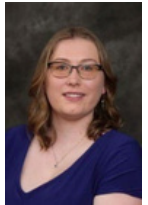

What a wonderful year it has been for JF! We've had so many amazing events throughout the year from provincial events and club events.

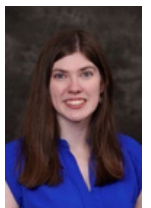

However, thanks to the great work of our membership, board and executive, we have been able to see some exciting financial growth this year. The 80th anniversary was a highlight and between ticket sales and the live and silent auctions, raised over \$4,000 for JFAO. OYFF was also very successful this year and resulted in a substantial profit.

In addition, our finances benefited from some cost saving measures such as reducing the amount of mail sent out to our alumni for the annual donation request and instead focusing on using email. Other cost savings occurred as events were able to access the leadership grant money for a portion of their expenses. We also updated our GICs in 2024 to ensure there are funds available from a GIC every year. This year, 2025, looks to be continuing the promising trend, as increased

memberships and plans to reduce unnecessary expenses should keep us in a strong financial position.

I want to thank our sponsorship coordinator, Jeanette Schramm for her work in gathering sponsorships this year. 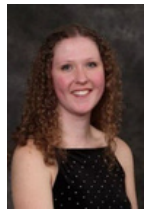
Great job to all the clubs.

Come on Down!

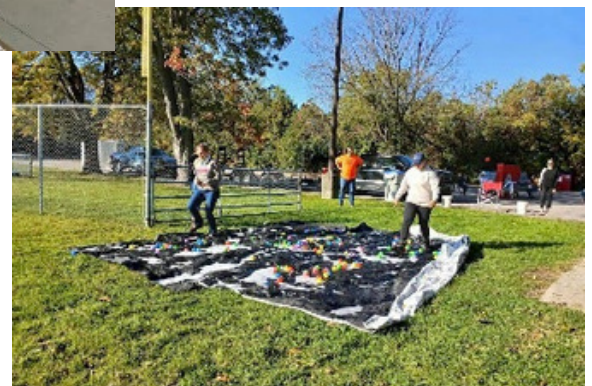

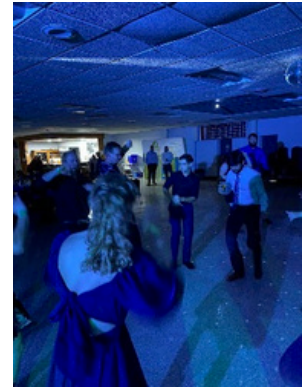

Ontario Young Farmers' Forum 2024

The Ontario Young Farmers Forum (OYFF), *Growing Ontario's Future*, ran alongside OFA's AGM on November 25 and 26, 2024. The event was well attended, with lots of engagement from those in attendance and the speakers kept everyone included with lots to learn. We had 31 attendees from all over Ontario come out with some being from JFAO and others being involved with their local OFA federations. On our first day, we got our introduction to the OYFF conference by OFA's Vice President Sara Woods. After the introductions, we made our way on to the bus and started off the conference by going to our first tour stop which was Fox Den Farms, which hosts the Old Toronto Polo club. At the polo farm, they explained to us the details on what is all involved when getting ready for a polo season, as well as the training aspects for it. They have members from all over the world that will stay in the area and come to their arena to train and participate in tournaments. Our second tour of the day was quite close by as it was the neighbouring farm! We went to Circling Hawk Honey and Meadery. They explained to us how they bought the farm and wanted to get into working with bees. They started up with some small hives and were slowly working to get more hives in an hour radius of the farm. So far, they have 23 locations that have hives on them as they have some full-time people working specifically on the hives. Another interesting aspect of the farm is that they are making their own mead on the farm, currently they have a wide variety of meads on hand and are looking into making more varieties as time allows. We finished off the night with a group dinner and being able to attend OFA's opening reception to mingle with everyone.

Day 2 started off with the Honourable Senator Rob Black coming to do the morning introductions to the OYFF participants and talking about his time when he was a JF member as well. Our first speaker of the day was with one of our sponsors for OYFF which was the Agricultural Credit Corporation (ACC). ACC spoke to us about the financing options that they offer to provide to young farmers in Ontario to help get past any challenges that may arise each year. They also talked about what to look for when working to get a loan or a credit from companies and how it could affect you or work in your favour, the group was very invested

in talking with ACC about farm financing and how they could get into it. Our second speakers of the day were the knowledge and research team from Ontario Soil and Crop Improvement Association talking to us about the importance of conducting on-farm research, and how to use the data from these trials to make informed decisions on your farm. They walked our delegates through the steps of setting up proper trials, how to infer from the information collected, and how to use these findings to make your operation more efficient. We broke out into several small discussion groups, and each group came up with a topic they wanted to research, and the best way to carry out

this project to get meaningful results. Our last speaker of the morning was from Haggerty Robotics. They are working hard on bringing robotics into the Ag industry to try and help improve production and decrease the work load on farmers. They were showing us robotic equipment that they have imported over the past 10 years and explained to us if this equipment was a good buy or if it just wasn't a right fit for the industry. As of now, they have been working more with Wineries and Vegetable farmers as the Robots are better suited to those farm standards; to just be removing weeds and doing small tillage work. The morning speakers were well received by everyone and it gave us a chance to break for lunch as we could sit with our counties at the OFA AGM. Many of these counties had sponsored members to go to OYFF so they like to hear about what we are learning and offer any insight on how to improve it. In the afternoon we attended the discussion panel that OFA had put on in the afternoon as was suggested by previous attendees that they would have liked to have done a little more with OFA. Doing this on the second day gave us the opportunity to include everyone with it. To finish off the day attendees had the opportunity to buy tickets for the harvest banquet which is a well-run event by OFA featuring local grown food from other fellow groups such as Beef Farmers of Ontario, Chicken Farmers of Ontario, and Turkey Farmers of Ontario. The event was a big success as we had a lot of positive feedback from the attendees saying they would be interested in going again as well as looking into signing up for Junior Farmers.



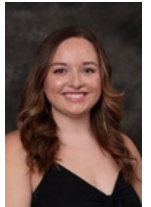
Social Media Representative

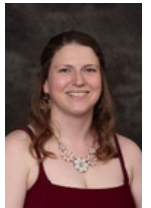


4-H Ontario Representative

and many more exciting things to come this spring and summer.

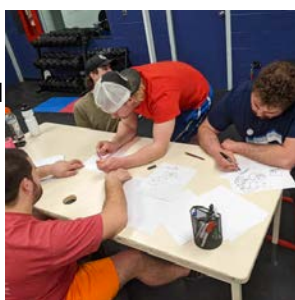
Club Reports

We would love to extend an invitation to all clubs—if anyone is interested in joining us, please don't hesitate to reach out for more details.

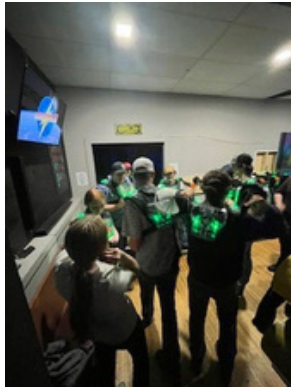

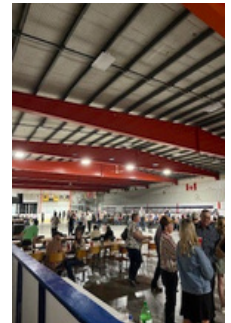


Members also assisted with set-up and take-down at local fairs, ensuring that these

Durham Region Junior Farmers

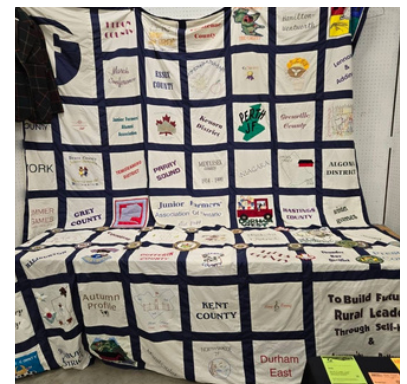

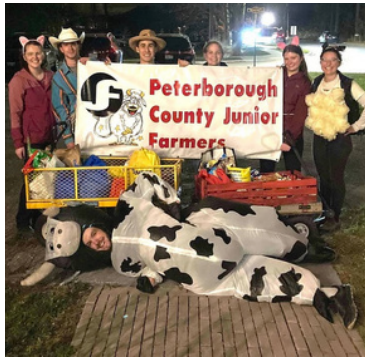




Peterborough County Junior Farmers
