I am proud of our Junior Farmer community this year with how much programming, experiences and fun we were able to offer our members, despite being in the midst of a global pandemic. With public health restrictions and many events being cancelled, our local clubs have found creative ways to fundraise. Coincidentally, unique lawn ornaments started appearing overnight throughout the province including cows, pigs, flamingoes and toilets. They all had the common goal of bringing a smile to a friend while raising money for local clubs, the Do More Ag Foundation and in Carleton County- for a family who had a barn fire. 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
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Club Reports

8 Tips to Prepare for Year End and Taxes

As the temperature drops, crops are harvested, and we prepare for winter; we need to look ahead and plan for next year and reflect on our past results. This means it's time to start thinking about what is involved and required to prepare your financial statements and tax return. It's important to know what reports your stakeholder(s) require ahead of the year end so that you can prepare accordingly. Meet with your lender to discuss your options for future expansion and to determine what reporting requirements they may have to issue credit. The following is a list of tips and considerations in the preparation for your financial statements and tax return.

1.Cash basis versus accrual -

- a. Cash basis accounting recognizes income and expenses when the cash changes hands. Changes to inventory, receivables, payable, and accruals do not factor into net income.
- b. Accrual accounting Recognized income and expenses when the goods changes hands or services are complete or partially complete, and not when money changes hands.

As farmers, you are eligible to claim your income and expenses on a cash basis or an accrual basis on your tax return. Note, once when you pick a method, you must continue using this method. This legal right to cash basis accounting allows you to control the timing of transactions. This flexibility can allow you to decrease your income by speeding up expenses (ex. prepaying for feed or seed) and/or slowing down revenues (ex. deferring a crop settlement to the next year), resulting in lower taxes for the current year. We recommend consulting with your accountant to optimize long-term tax planning. Note that accrual accounting must be followed when preparing the financial statements. Adjusting net income for accounts receivables, payables, prepaids, and accruals helps provide the most meaningful reports to the financial statement users.

- 2.Inventory It's important to do a complete inventory count on the date of your year end to ensure you have accurate quantities. It is much easier recording an actual count at year end versus creating a headache a few months from year end recalling on memory. Include each class of animal (ex. weight categories, bull vs. milking cow vs. bred heifer), and each type of crop in bins or grain bank storage, total acres of crops in ground, feed, fertilizer, seeds, and supplies.
- 3.Production reports –Summarizing the following will help with financial statements preparation but it can also be a great analyses tool. You can compare year over year results to see where your farm may be succeeding or struggling in different areas. Comparing data to other farms or industry reports, such as crop yield reports by county from OMAFRA, can help you identify problem areas. You should consider:
 - a. Number of animal births, deaths, purchased, and sold for each class
 - b. Acres and yields of crops, amounts sold, and used for feed and seed

These reports can also be required in farm risk management programs such as AgriStability.

4.Bookkeeping – If you've fallen behind, now is a good time to catch up on your bookkeeping. Review what you have entered and compare to last year. Have you missed something or posted an item inconsistently? Reach out to your accountant if you need help with bookkeeping, they will be more than willing to train you. It's also important to get organized. File your paperwork in a way that makes it easy to reference (ex. alphabetically by vendor for online payments, deposit dates, and cheque numbers). This will reduce your time finding documents that your accountant may request or if you are providing all the records to your accountant, they can easily find the document they are looking for.

- 5. Structure As your farming operations and life change over the years, it's important to reflect on your current business structure ahead of the new year. The most common structures are proprietorship, partnership, and corporation. Each structure has pros and cons and must be thoroughly analyzed prior to changing your farm structure. The proper structure will minimize tax, protect your assets, and better position you for expansion and succession. We highly encourage you to contact your accountant to ensure your farm is appropriately structured before heading into the new year.
- 6. Compensation Consider how you participate in your business to ensure you are compensated accordingly. Do you provide all the daily labour or do you provide the land that is farmed? Based on your business structure, there are different forms of compensation available. Compensation can be in the form of an employee (wages), a shareholder (dividends), a creditor (interest), or a landlord (rent). Each type of compensation listed is treated differently for tax purposes. To ensure you choose the most advantageous method, seek advice from your accountant who will clarify the options available so you can make an informed decision.
- 7. Consider tax changes Every year, there are several tax changes, both personally, provincially, and federally. 2021 was no exception. If you are in the position to consider expanding in the next few years, contact your accountant to determine if there are any tax changes that negatively or positively impact your tax return. Tax changes come with firm dates and deadlines to follow and it's important you meet these to maximize your tax goal. For example, in Ontario this year, some corporations are eligible for a 20% tax credit to a maximum of \$90,000 on the cost of building a new barn through the Ontario Regional Opportunities Investment Tax Credit. Understanding these tax changes could affect your tax return and your bank account.
- 8. Checklist Lastly, if providing information to an accountant, ask for a checklist of items required to prepare the statements. Examples include the most recent loan agreements, investment balances, copies of bank statements and cheques, detailed inventory listing, accounts receivable, accounts payable, and any prepaids or accruals. These are imperative to your accountant as they can only interpret to an extent the activity that has occurred on your farm during the year. The more organized the information provided is, the less time is spent in preparing more accurate financial statements.


